### **ACSA introduces LAG policy**

1 June 2007. The Airports Company of South Africa (ACSA) has introduced a LAG policy, which will govern what Liquids, Aerosols and Gels (LAGs) a passenger can carry onboard in their hand luggage and how these items should be presented. This policy puts South Africa in line with international safety regulations.

All passengers travelling on international flights must place their Liquids, Gels and Aerosols in a plastic bag (no bigger than 20x 20cm). All of the LAG products must be in containers of 100ml or smaller. Any LAG items greater than this will be confiscated.

This means that passengers cannot bring containers over 100ml in their hand luggage even if these containers are only partially filled.

Baby formula and food, as well as medication carried on-board need not be in your LAGs bag but travellers will be requested to show these items to Security and may be required to produce the requisite prescription for medicines.

Duty-free items will be allowed onboard to most destinations (Australia is still an exception at this stage), but the goods must be sealed in a special bag with proof of payment. This seal should not be broken before arriving at your final destination.
